Kawakami refers to this song as being a party on the beach. Who better to know what parties on the beach sound like than a native Hawaiian? Kawakami, born and raised in Oahu, now living in Los Angeles said, "The roots of this track are set by my KoAloha 'Ukulele, and the island sound turns funky and frenzied as the bass and rhythms are set in place. Vocals tell the story and that is when you will want to dance ~ so let beach party begin."

Kawakami has produced and written songs for the Hawaii Tourism Authority, Suntory Beer Japan, McDonalds Hawaii, and last year Kawakami co- produced a top 40 charting album. If you have a minute to check out his YouTube page, there are quite a few interesting pop and rock covers worthy of note including "Smooth" originally done by **Santana** and **Rob Thomas**, and "Thinking of You" by **Ed Sheeran**.

Alx Kawakami – founding member of ManoaDNA, now based in Los Angeles – pays homage to a hula dancer with "Fireknife," his first release as a solo artist.

Hula dancers have been inspiring songwriters for more than a century. Kawakami's song is a catchy and contemporary hapa haole mash-up of Hawaiian ukulele and acoustic guitar with a rocking pop rhythm section and assorted electronic effects.

The opening bars focus on Kawakami the ukulele player. From there arrangement spotlights his voice, the rhythm section, and his version of a classic island fantasy: A man watching a hula dancer likes what he sees and wants to see more – "Shaking in your grass skirt, show a little under, so much more I wanna see."

"(I'm) Sweating like a mai tai, melting on your shave ice, hit me with a hurricane," Kawakami sings passionately. Sounds like serious physical attraction!

As a footnote: The title of the song refers to the fact that the hula dancer is spinning like a Samoan fire-knife dancer.
